TTP Purpose (25 CFR 170)

Provide safe and adequate transportation and public road access to and within reservations, Indian lands and communities.....

Contribute to economic development, self-determination and employment of Indians and Alaska Natives.....

TTP Guiding Principles (25 CFR 170)

Promote the rights of tribal governments to govern their own affairs.....

Ensure implementation is consistent with tribal sovereignty and the government-to-government relationship.....

Encourage flexibility and innovation in program implementation.....

Regulations will be liberally construed for the benefit of Tribes.....





TTP Funding Set-asides

Safety Fund 4%

- to address transportation safety issues identified by <u>federally recognized Indian tribes</u> through a competitive, discretionary program. Projects are chosen whose outcomes will reduce fatal and serious injuries in transportation related incidents, such as motor vehicle crashes.
- FHWA advocates the development of strategic transportation safety plans as a means for tribes to determine how transportation safety needs will be addressed in and around tribal communities. See additional information on developing safety plans.

Planning Funds 2%

 The Federal Highway Administration Office of Tribal Transportation works in partnership with Tribal Governments and the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) to achieve Tribal Transportation Program (TTP) planning on Tribal lands.

High Priority Program

\$9,000,000 of the available TTP funds are set aside for the Tribal HPP Program. *

Tribal High Priority Projects (Tribal HPP) Program The Tribal HPP Program, as established under 23 U.S.C. 202, is a nationwide priority program for:

- 1.An Indian Tribe or governmental subdivision of an Indian Tribe whose annual allocation of funding under the Tribal Transportation Program is insufficient to complete the highest priority project of the Indian Tribe or governmental subdivision of an Indian Tribe; or
- 2. Any Indian Tribe that has an emergency or disaster with respect to a transportation facility included on the national inventory of Tribal transportation facilities under section 202(b)(1) of Title 23, United States Code.

^{*} Addn'l \$30,000,000 out of the general fund of the Treasury for each fiscal years 2022 through 2026, if Congress passes this funding in their legislation

Tribal Transportation Program Bridge Fund

Eliminated 3% Set-aside from TTP

Bridge Formula Program – 3% Set-aside \$165 M/year (AA)

Bridge Investment Program Set-aside \$20 M/year (AA)

Bridge Investment Program Set-aside

- FY22 \$16 M (CA)
- FY23 \$18 M (CA)
- FY24 \$20 M (CA)

National Significant Federal Lands and Tribal Project Program

FY22 - \$125 M available

- 7 grant recipients (3 Tribal!)

 - The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes in Montana
 - The Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe in Nevada
 - The Cherokee Nation in Oklahoma

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law – Section 14003

Allows a Tribe to determine, on behalf of the Secretaries of Interior or Transportation, whether a TTP project is categorically excluded from the preparation of an EA or EIS under NEPA.

FHWA developed a Programmatic Agreement template based on example Programmatic Categorical Exclusions (PCEs) between FHWA and State DOTs

This PCE is currently available to FHWA PA Tribes.

Consultation Needs in Planning

Integrated planning

- •Federal agencies working together
- How do we deliver while effectively utilizing resources? Leveraging TIPs?
- •FHWA at the table of gov-gov conversations (+ states, FLMA, counties)
- •Tribal Liaisons are critical to help from planning delivery maintenance
- Promote Tribal consultation at State DOTs
- •State DOT, MPO, RPOs engaging Tribes in transportation planning
- Project level Section 106 Consultations
- Capturing historical climate change experiences from elders to inform plans > sustainability

Understanding mutual context - <u>NCAI</u> view that leadership at DOT and FHWA should advocate for Tribal needs and foster understanding

- •Reaching Tribes where they are located to understand perspectives and issues
- •Create an understanding of the unique Tribal circumstances (ex: cost of materials in Alaska)
- Understanding the small details
- •Meeting the stakeholders ex: how BIA works with Tribes
- •No response from Tribes




